


A is for Anstee - Dame Margaret Joan Anstee, DCMG (25 June 1926 – 25 August 2016) was a British diplomat who served at the United Nations for over four decades (1952–93), rising to the rank of an Under-Secretary-General in 1987. She was the first woman to hold this position. Anstee grew up in Chelmsford, Essex, in rural England. Neither of her parents had finished secondary school, and they encouraged her to complete her education. She was educated at Chelmsford County High School for Girls and Newnham College, Cambridge. She graduated with first class honours in French and Spanish in 1944, although it was another

three years before the university began admitting women to full degree status.



C is for Curie - Born Maria Sklodowska on November 7, 1867, in Warsaw, Poland, Marie Curie became the first woman to win a Nobel Prize and the only woman to win the award in two different fields (physics and chemistry). Curie's efforts, with her husband Pierre Curie, led to the discovery of polonium and radium and, after Pierre's death, the further development of X-rays. She died on July 4, 1934.



E is for Einstein - Albert Einstein was a German-born theoretical physicist. He developed the theory of relativity, one of the two pillars of modern physics. Einstein's work is also known for its influence on the philosophy of science. Einstein is best known by the general public for his mass—energy equivalence formula $E = mc^2$. He received the 1921 Nobel Prize in Physics "for his services to theoretical physics, and especially for his discovery of the law of the photoelectric effect", a pivotal step in the evolution of quantum theory.



M is for Monnet - Jean Omer Marie Gabriel Monnet (9/11/1888 – 16/3/1979) was a French political economist and diplomat. An influential supporter of European unity, he is considered as one of the founding fathers of the European Union. He has been called "The Father of Europe" by those who see his innovative and pioneering efforts in the 1950s as the key to establishing the European Coal and Steel Community, the predecessor of today's European Union. Never elected to public office, Monnet worked behind the scenes of American and European governments as a well-connected *pragmatic internationalist*. He

was named patron of the 1980–1981 academic year at the College of Europe, in honour of his accomplishments.




N is for Nobel - Born on October 21, 1833, in Stockholm, Sweden, Alfred Nobel worked at his father's arms factory as a young man. Intellectually curious, he went on to experiment with chemistry and explosives. In 1864, a deadly explosion killed his younger brother. Deeply affected, Nobel developed a safer explosive: dynamite. Nobel used his vast fortune to establish the Nobel Prizes, which has come to be known for awarding the greatest achievements throughout the world. He died of a stroke in 1896.



P is for Picasso - Born in Málaga, Spain, in 1881, Pablo Picasso, became one of the greatest and most influential artists of the 20th century and the creator (with Georges Braque) of Cubism. A Spanish expatriate painter, sculptor, printmaker, ceramicist and stage designer, Picasso was considered radical in his work. After a long prolific career, he died on April 8, 1973, in Mougins, France.



S is for Seacole - Mary Jane Seacole OM was a Jamaican businesswoman who set up the British Hotel behind the lines during the Crimean War. She described this as "a mess-table and comfortable quarters for sick and convalescent officers", and provided succour for wounded servicemen on the battlefield. She was posthumously awarded the Jamaican Order of Merit in 1991. In 2004, she was voted the greatest black Briton.



T is for Tolstoy - On September 9, 1828, Leo Tolstoy was born in Tula Province, Russia. In the 1860s, he wrote his first great novel, *War and Peace*. In 1873, Tolstoy set to work on the second of his best known novels, *Anna Karenina*. He continued to write fiction throughout the 1880s and 1890s. One of his most successful later works was *The Death of Ivan Ilyich*. Tolstoy died on November 20, 1910 in Astapovo, Russia.

WHAT WILL I LEARN?

In the first three years at Anglo European School you will follow a broad range of subjects, building upon all that you have experienced in primary school. The timetable is divided into 50 lessons in each fortnight as illustrated (we refer to a fortnight as one "cycle"). You will be given a timetable on your first day at school in September.

ARBOR

From September, Anglo European School will be using **Arbor** as our main online platform for both students and parents. Arbor is where you'll be able to:

- See your timetable and daily schedule
- Check your homework and assignments
- View your attendance, behaviour and achievement records
- Access reports and other important school information

You'll be given your login details at the start of term. Make sure you remember your password and keep it safe — never share it with anyone else. Arbor also has a mobile app that can be downloaded by students and parents, or you can log in via a web browser. Parents will use Arbor to receive updates, messages and important information about school life.

TRAVEL INFORMATION

Travel Safely

All roads can be dangerous, and each of those around Anglo European School have their perils.

Ingatestone Village – The village has very narrow pavements. Stick to them. Do not walk on the road. Use the Zebra crossing where possible. Do not walk into the road.

Willow Green – At the start and the end of each day, cars go up and down this road. The pavements are very narrow. Take care and do not go onto the road to 'overtake' other walkers. Stay on the pavement.

Fryerning Lane - Take care. Part of this road does not have pavements and can be dangerous. Walk in pairs and check the road for traffic before crossing the roads.

Where can your parents/carers drop you off? – Parents/carers are encouraged to drop students off at the New Road entrance and/or the main highstreet. Parents/carers should avoid coming in to the main school car park. The main school car park can be very busy and so we want to avoid as many cars as possible for health and safety reasons.

Where can your parents/carers pick you up? – Parents/Carers are asked to pick students up from New Road and/or the highstreet. Parents are NOT able to collect student from the main school car park, which is locked at the end of the day.

<u>Trains</u>

A large number of our students use the trains every day to come to school and travel home. Ingatestone station is very busy and has narrow platforms; therefore, it is essential that all students behave appropriately for everyone's safety.

Bus stops

If you plan on taking the bus to school you should try out your journey beforehand and do a few practice runs so you know where to get on and where to get off.

Student Services

Student services is the place to go should you not know where to go, need someone to talk to or have any general pastoral need whilst at school. We have an excellent Pastoral and Student Services team, who will be ready to help you. You can find then in C block in C4!

Lost Property

If you look after your belongings there should be no lost property. Put your name on EVERYTHING and be careful not to leave things lying around. Accidents do happen and lost property can be reclaimed from Student Services. But don't leave it at that! Even before going to look in Lost Property (via student services in C block), retrace your steps back to the time you last knew you had it. Do your own detective work! If you still cannot find the item(s) you have lost, report it to student services in C block.

The indoor highway code

Keep to the LEFT as you walk down the corridors and up the stairs. Don't run or shout. When queuing up for lunch or lining up outside the classroom, wait sensibly and do not block the corridor.

Going out of School

NEVER leave the premises without permission from a member of staff. The only students who may go out of school at lunchtime are Sixth Formers. If you need to leave the school during the day for an appointment e.g. the doctors or the dentist, you must bring a note from your parents. The note must be presented to student services (C block). YOU MUST ALWAYS SIGN OUT AT STUDENT SERVICES (C BLOCK) AND IN AGAIN WHEN YOU RETURN.


OUT OF BOUNDS

- Classrooms
- Bike Shelter
- Car Park

School buildings (A, B, C, D, E, L, M, P, S, T block). During the school day, when you are not in lessons, you should only be inside the school buildings if you are going to the toilet, attending a club, or if you have been asked to speak to a member of staff. You are not allowed to hang around inside the buildings with your friends, as this can often lead to lessons/staff offices being disturbed.

LLD WARNINGS

There may be occasions when you forget to follow the classroom expectations. If this occurs, you will be given a warning. Three warnings lead to an LLD Detention (a Low-Level Disruption Detention). If you receive one of these, you will have a lunchtime detention. To avoid this, make sure that you follow the Anglo Ready, Respectful, Safe expectations.

- Ensure your mobile phone is switched off


"I DON'T FEEL VERY WELL..."

If you feel unwell at any time, ask your teacher if you may report to the Medical Support Officer at the School Office. Your teacher will give you a yellow medical slip with the date and time on. You must have one of these to go to the medical room during a lesson.

If you need to go home, your parent or carer will be asked to collect you, otherwise you may be sent to rest in the medical room for a while.....or it may be decided that you are better off continuing quietly in your lessons. You should NEVER contact your parents direct to ask them to collect you. The decision about whether you should be sent home rests with the Medical Support Officer.



FIRE DRILL

If you discover a fire, immediately tell any member of staff or operate the nearest alarm call point. We regularly practice a firm alarm drill and your form tutor will explain what you have to do on the first day of school and at regular intervals throughout the year. If you hear the fire alarm, you must listen to your teacher's instructions and leave the building quietly and sensibly. All students gather on the field in their correct spaces and a register is taken. You then wait for further instructions.

LOCKDOWN DRILL

A continuous alarm will ring if all students and staff need to stay indoors. If you are outside because it is breaktime, lunchtime or between classrooms, then you need to move into the nearest space such as the hall, sports hall or any classroom. Your teachers will instruct you what to do when you are safely inside. We do not practise the lockdown alarm (but regularly sound the alarm to remind you of the sound).

WHAT TO WEAR



This is what your school uniform should look like. Presentable, smart and clean. If you have any issues with your uniform, please see student services.

Your Form Tutor will check your uniform daily to ensure that it is correct. If for any reason you have misplaced an item, you must have a note from your parent explaining why you are not in correct uniform and when it will be rectified. This needs to be given to the pastoral office (C4). If you fail to wear your uniform correctly you may receive a detention.

SCHOOL UNIFORM AND P.E. KIT

YEAR 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11

Main School Uniform:

- Navy blazer with school badge
- Gold blouse with collar, to be worn tucked in with no tie
- Plain white shirt with collar, to be worn tucked in and with a school tie
- Navy skirt with AES logo or black/grey trousers (ankle length, tailored and not flared). Denim, cords, lycra and leggings are **not acceptable**.
- Plain black/navy socks, black/navy tights (not both).

Optional:

- A plain navy V-necked pullover with gold trim and school badge may be worn, but only under a blazer.
- Navy polo shirt with Anglo logo for summer term only

Shoes:

- Plain black shoes without commercial logos.
- No boots, sandals, trainers, plimsolls or canvas shoes.
- Shoes should be of a safe and sensible style. Shoes should have a low heel. High heels of any sort are not acceptable.
- Black laces.

Jewellery:

- For reasons of safety only limited items of jewellery are permitted. One small stud earring may be worn in the lower lobe of each ear. These must be removed for PE; therefore, any new piercing must be done at the start of the six-week holidays. Parents who wish their child to wear a piece of jewellery for religious reasons must apply to the Headteacher for an exemption.
- No other facial or visible body piercings are allowed; this includes nose and tongue piercings.
- A wristwatch may be worn but no smart watches are permitted to be worn during tests/examinations

Make Up & Accessories:

- Discreet make-up is permitted.
- Hand decoration is not permitted, unless for religious observance.
- Nail varnish or false nails are not permitted.
- False eyelashes are not permitted.

Headwear:

- All accessories must be black or navy.
- There is no restriction on hair colour or style.
- Long or beaded hair must be pulled back for sports and practical subjects.
- No sunglasses

Outdoor Wear Only:

Plain black or navy coat with minimal logo – needs to be waterproof. No leather or denim.

- Plain dark hats, scarves and gloves
- Hooded tops are not permitted.
- Clothing associated with sports teams (other than AES) are not permitted.

PE KIT supplied by Price and Buckland

Essential:

- Royal blue polo shirt with yellow piping and school logo.
- Royal blue skort, or Royal blue shorts with yellow piping and school logo.
- Royal blue socks with yellow top.
- Royal blue reversible Rugby shirt with yellow piping and school logo and/or Royal blue sweatshirt.
- Rugby gum shield.
- Sports training shoes (not plimsolls), no Velcro fastenings.
- Any colour football or rugby boots and football shin pads.

Optional:

- Navy blue tracksuit with yellow piping and school logo.
- Royal blue base layer top.
- Royal blue or black base layer leggings.

Wearing Glasses Whilst Playing Sports:

If your child needs to wear glasses in order to safely participate in PE and be able to see clearly, they are required to wear specialist sports glasses for any contact sports such as football and rugby. You may also wish to consider sports glasses for other ball games such as netball and basketball.







For those students interested in joining the Paris Saint-Germain Academy, parents have been sent the link to register by 18th July.






